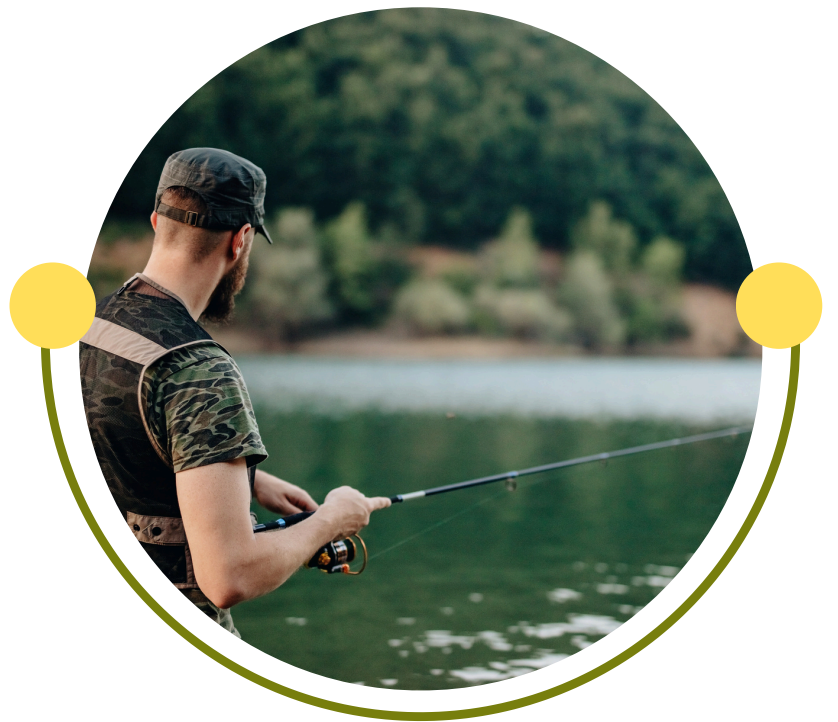

The Meeting of Waters

Originating in Peru, the Solimões River converges with the dark waters of the Negro River, flowing side by side without immediately mixing. The phenomenon, known as the “The Meeting of Waters”, gives rise to the Amazon River, which boasts numerous navigable tributaries, facilitating the transport of goods and people across the region. As the river winds through the continent, it connects several port cities, serving as gateways to explore this vast ecosystem. Because each river is distinctly colored, they create a visually captivating and unique natural spectacle before eventually blending.



Diving with the pink river dolphin

On this thrilling tour, gives you the opportunity to get up close and personal with the docile pink dolphins. Guided by experienced professionals, you will experience moments of pure magic as you observe these magnificent animals in their natural habitat.



A dive in history

Xamanic visitations villages


Visit a village inhabited by Indians from various ethnic groups in the region. This enriching experience immerses you in the vibrant culture of communities whose ancestors have lived in these territories for over 14,000 years. Learn about daily life in an Indigenous village, explore the history of the ethnic groups, and witness their traditions, including dances and rituals.



Anavilhanas National Park

Embark on boat trips through one of the world's largest river archipelagos, where you can swim in the pristine waters of the Negro River and experience other breathtaking attractions. At Anavilhanas National Park, the Negro River presents a unique setting that offers countless possibilities for sensations, experiences and learning, in a labyrinth of islands and mirror-black waters that changes with the variation in the river level, in an invitation to challenge our limits and broaden our vision of the world.





The mysteries of crystalline waters

Presidente Figueiredo

A visit to the Presidente Figueiredo region is a must for jungle trekking enthusiasts. Located 126 km from Manaus, this region was once home to Indigenous peoples and is now one of the Amazon's premier tourist destinations. It's known for its spectacular waterfalls, caves, and well-structured infrastructure that caters to visitors.

Deciding which attractions to include in your itinerary depends on how much time you have to choose your route, as well as the level of difficulty of the trails you are willing to face on your adventure.

Gruta da Judeia



Other must-see waterfalls in Presidente Figueiredo include Lagoa Cristalina, Pedra Furada, Caverna da Maroaga and Gruta da Judeia. The best time to visit any of these attractions is when the rivers are full, between February and June. The Cachoeira da Neblina is also breathtaking. It has the highest waterfall of all. Accessing it requires a 12-kilometer round-trip hike.

Mutum Circuit

As summer arrives in the Amazon, the rivers begin to dry up. These water-carved pools, formed over thousands of years, delight the body and enchant the eyes of visitors. The

Mutum Circuit also includes other waterfalls, one of which is hidden amidst lush greenery. The best time to visit is between October and January.



Local culture



Another tourist attraction in Presidente Figueiredo is the local culture. The town is known for its handicrafts, such as ceramics, embroidery and crochet. Visitors can also explore the Homem do Norte Museum, which tells the story of the region's Indigenous peoples and their relationship with the Amazon rainforest. Don't miss the local cuisine, rich in regional fish and fruits like tucumã, pupunha, and açaí.



Survival immersion in the jungle



The jungle survival package is an experience itinerary designed for people who enjoy challenges and want to experience full immersion in nature. These are days spent camping in the jungle with ancestral techniques and knowledge from the riverside communities, such as night spotting, discussions on medicinal plants, fruit gathering, bird watching, and lessons in basic survival skills.

Adventurers will have the opportunity to learn how to build their own camps, source food from animals and plants, and handle essential resources like water and fire.

Take some time to get to know the capital Manaus

While Manaus' proximity to the Central Amazon Biosphere draws many visitors, it's worth dedicating a day to explore the largest city in the Brazilian Amazon before your return. With a population of around 2 million inhabitants.

Manaus is accessible only by boat or plane and offers dozens of sightseeing tours such as a visit to the Manaus Opera House, the Municipal Market, the beach of Ponta Negra, and the opportunity to taste the delicious traditional food of the region's restaurants.

When is the best time to plan your trip to the Amazon?

The flooding and lowering of the rivers in the Amazon

One factor that will shape your Amazon trip is the seasonal flooding and receding of the rivers. The Amazon's landscape changes dramatically throughout the year, so understanding how river levels affect activities, wildlife, and your connection with nature is essential for planning your trip.

The flood season in the Amazon

The rainy season in the Amazon runs from December to May, with the highest temperatures and heaviest rains from February to mid-March/April. The rivers take some time to rise and reach the height considered to be the flood season.

By April and May, the rivers have gained volume, but the peak flood season occurs between June and September. During this period, the rivers form igapós (flooded forests), allowing unique navigation experiences, often at treetop height. Many animals are more active and reproduce during this time.

By July, canoe trips, forest navigation, and the stunning reflections of the sky in the dark waters are at their best. As the rivers reach their highest levels, rainfall begins to taper off.



The Dry Season in the Amazon

The dry season runs from June to November, with significantly reduced rainfall. As the rains subside, the river levels gradually recede. By October, the driest time of the year, beaches that were previously submerged begin to emerge, and temperatures rise significantly.

Between October and November, the rivers reach their lowest levels, offering opportunities to enjoy forest beaches, hiking trails, and various other activities. In December, as the rivers remain low, the rains return, starting the cycle anew and transforming the Amazon once again.



Pack your bags with:

- Light clothing: (long-sleeved shirts, shorts, pants, hats, bathing suits)
- Comfortable shoes: (hiking shoes, slippers, sandals)
- Travel essentials: (documents, money, credit/debit cards, medicines, sunscreen, after-sun gel, insect repellent (mosquitoes are common in the region))
- Jungle Trekking Gear: (waterproof clothing, flashlight, reusable water bottle)
- Electronic devices (cell phone, camera, charger).
